
KYC students were generous in making our guests feel a part of the school and in showing them around Hong Kong.

"Oh my! This must be the lost golden wagon!" she screamed uncontrollably, and moved to where the signal came from.


Click. Pow. Boom.



Round 3: that Nuclear (fission) power should have a place in Hong Kong's future.



Film review: Echoes of the Rainbow

Echoes of the Rainbow, a film directed by Alex Law, won the Crystal Bear for the Best Film in the Children's Jury "Generation Kplus" category at the 2010 Berlin Film Festival and several awards. The story was set in 1960s British Hong Kong and was shot on the historical Wing Lee Street in Sheung Wan. The film was really successful. It evoked memories for the older generation; it resonates with them. And, it increases awareness of Hong Kong's special culture.

The background of the film is the 1960s in Hong Kong. During the 60s, Hong Kong was administered by the British. A normal family with two children, who runs a shoe shop, is the main center of the film. In the film, Araif Lee acts as Jin-Yi Law (the eldest) who is later diagnosed with leukemia. Jin-Er, known as Big Ears, is the film's narrator.

The film is touching, warm, humorous and meaningful. The director uses a regular family as the main characters to tell the audience how hard life was in the 1960s Hong Kong and the spirit of the

Lion Rock.

Although their life is really hard during that time, the people are still happy. Through this film, I learnt about the background of the 1960s HK. They would have dinner in the street with many families; a picture you can't imagine in this 21st century. They would share food with each other. Neighbours were a part of the family.

Some children in the 60s studied in schools that were on rooftops, no air-conditioners, no fans. They just had some simple things, like desks, chairs and a blackboard. I think we are now so happy, we have an abundance of things.

In the film, Jin-Er always wears a transparent bowl to go everywhere. It reflects that children in 60s didn't have many toys. Not like today's children who play on iPhones and computers every day. Wing Lee Street, where the film was shot, is being preserved. This film not only reminds us of the memories of Hong Kong people, but also preserves the character of this historical street.

'My schoolmates and I had a great time joining the Academic Week with English and Science from the 23rd to the 25th of April. We learnt about Science in English while the interactive game booths gave us an unforgettable experience with interesting activities and prizes.

One science booth was called DNA. It was about how to generate DNA fingerprints which could be used to identify individuals. In DNA fingerprinting, knowledge of electric fields was applied; DNA fragments of different sizes were separated using gel electrophoresis. Just like other organisms in the world, light things move faster while heavy ones move slowly-shorter ones move faster than longer ones.

I know that people use this application daily to identify victims or identify a child's parents. This booth increased my knowledge and at the same time provided me with a chance to have some experience in forensic science.'

Also 'What's That?' was about matching words and pictures in a one-minute time limit. I really enjoyed the game and learnt some new vocabulary.'




Ho Ka Wing 1B

The desserts look different in appearance. The egg tart is like a small flower shape and the colour is yellow. A waffle is a semi-circle shape like a half – moon, and its colour is golden brown. If

we compare their size, the egg tart is not as big as the waffle. Egg tarts are as small as your palm, but a waffle is as big as a plate.
