A poem about a tree will look like a tree.

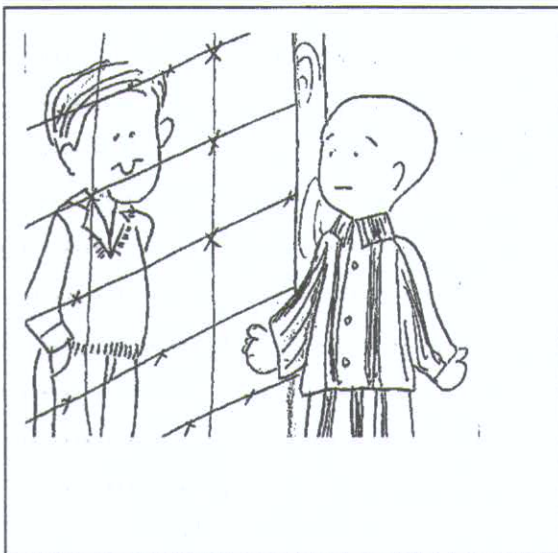
A poem about a butterfly will look like a butterfly

Storyboard

A storyboard is a series of frames depicting the plot of a story. Film directors use them in the planning process of a film.

Narration:

Dialogue:

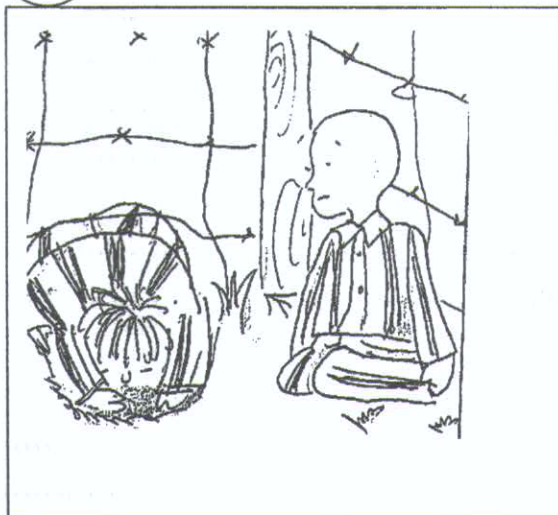
Shmuel: I thought you weren't coming.

Narration:

Bruno finishes digging the hole and he throws the shovel to the ground. He bends down to climb into the hole. Shmuel looks around anxiously, hoping that no one will notice them.

Dialogue:

Shmuel: That's enough (digging).
